### HIV Testing Program in Jeopardy!!

ARCW has learned that the Brown County Health Department's proposed

budget for 2004 contains a 100 percent cut in funding for anonymous HIV testing. Brown County Executive Carol Kelso is currently considering this recommendation and will be making a final decision as early as this week.

Currently, Brown County provides \$22,000 annually for anonymous HIV testing in Green Bay and surrounding areas. Last year, more than 400 individuals at risk for HIV were tested under safe, anonymous conditions in Brown County by ARCW.

We urge you to contact Brown County Executive Carol Kelso to let her know that anonymous HIV testing is vital to protecting Brown County against AIDS.

Talking Points: Anonymous testing for HIV plays a critical role in preventing the spread of AIDS. Individuals at highest risk for HIV are significantly less likely to take an HIV test that is not anonymous. When anonymous HIV testing is unavailable, many highest-risk individuals will remain unaware of their HIV status and their ability to transmit the virus, constituting a serious threat to public health.

CDC guidelines specify that anonymous testing is vital for HIV prevention and treatment. Anonymous testing means earlier care and longer life for people with HIV. ARCW is the only

provider of anonymous HIV testing in Brown County. Loss of anonymous HIV testing would place Brown County residents at higher risk for HIV and shorten the lives of those in Brown County who contract the virus.

### Letter from the President

Although the warm temperatures of the past few weeks would have us believe otherwise, the colorful displays offered by the arrival of Fall remind us that another Summer has come to a close.

I would like you to know that the **POSITIVE VOICE** board members (newly elected last May) were very busy this past summer. Some of the work included: planning future PV meetings, newsletter distributions, brochure redesigns, discussing/redesigning our Website, brain storming fund raising/

grant writing/community outreach options and much more.

Invitations were sent out to the women in our organization to meet in August with **PV** Board members. In that meeting, we discussed what **PV** can do as an organization to better serve woman's interests, needs, and issues. September was eventful on many fronts. Membership met with the Mayor of Green Bay on community and GLBT issues, attended the PFLAG Midwest Regional Conference in Madison (walking through pickets on the Madison square as organized/sponsored by the religious right), attendance at Legal Equality Action Day -LEAD in Madison at the Capitol, and joint participation as a vendor with PFLAG in Appleton's Octoberfest fund raiser.

In October, we will meet at the Appleton Public Library to officially unveil and review the new PV Website ([www.pvinc.org](http://www.pvinc.org)) and discuss intended offerings that will be available to all ages of our community.

For November, Appleton will again be the site for our meeting with guest speaker and Milwaukee GLBT activist/SAGE member Eldon Murray.

In December, we have booked our festive and popular Holiday Dinner at the Eagles Nest in Green Bay. Our Annual New Years Eve Party at Liberty Hall is also in the works with some new and exciting changes. For the remainder of Winter and Spring 2004, we have already started to flesh out some topics and events for our membership. Suggestions are welcome—drop us a line, or send an e-mail.



As I write this, it is National Coming Out Day. At our last **PV** board meeting, we collectively reflected on how the significance of this day has changed over the years. For many years, we were the "unseen" minority. "In the closet" described how we hid our sexuality from the critical eye of others or protected ourselves from our own internalized

homophobia. We sought needed comfort and safety by seeking out and being among others that identified as GLBT or supportive. However, with the advent of AIDS into the public consciousness in 80's, many AIDS victims were thrown out of the closet without their permission. The cry for equal rights in the 80's took on a new national momentum of which National Coming Out Day was borne in 1987. Annual parades, Pride Festivals, conferences and organizations sprang up across the country and around the world.

16 years later, we celebrate many victories on the road to justice. Today's television media has found that gay characters are "in vogue" and help sell their shows to large audiences. Many of us are out to family, friends and/or co-workers. However, citizens of the United States though we are, we still do not enjoy true equal rights and remain second class citizens in our own country. Many of us continue to closet ourselves into the protective isolation that has become so familiar.

Action Wisconsin's Andy Sampson met with his state Rep. Gregg Underheim during Legal Equality Action Day this past September. "The Capital Times" reported: "Underheim suggested that gay rights supporters should join groups like the Kiwanis and take part in more community activities." AW Board Member Tony Sheehan said it is difficult for someone to go to the Rotary Club in Medford and come out as gay.

"I would not feel comfortable going to a Rotary Club, though I agree on their service mission," Sampson added.

"If you're in the Rotary Club and you're a good member, it doesn't matter," Underheim said. "You'll never win in the Legislature until you win the hearts and minds of the public. My sense is that social change follows broad public consensus. Civil rights legislation didn't pass until the public really believed. Public consensus has not been reached on this issue."

I have been working to digest the numerous experiences, conversations, speeches, news articles and emails I have

encountered during the past few months. It has become clear to me how important it is for each of us to take what may be a new direction for the rest of our lives. If we are to truly be embraced into society, we must become actively engaged in the larger society. Perhaps that is what Rep Underheim is trying to say and it may be somewhat representative of how many feel in the straight community. Being OUT to family, friends and co-workers is very important. However, what can each of us be doing to be more engaged in the greater community around us, thus ensuring we are visible?

Perhaps we each need to examine our own life and determine what we support and have in common with the larger community. This might help dispel the fear and misunderstandings about us that perpetuates hateful beliefs still harbored by many in the straight community.

In the book "Farm Boys" by Will Fellows, farmers remark on how they felt about the "queer" farm boy in their community. "He may be queer, but he's our queer" speaks viscerally of the support that one farm boy felt in his community. Perhaps that should be a part of our goal, too, in working to gain our equal rights.

## National Coming Out Day: PV Honors Everyday Revelations

Does National Coming Out Day seem contrived -- as though people are expected to announce their sexual orientations with baked goods and Hallmark cards?

The Human Rights Campaign explains that National Coming Out Day developed from the 1987 march on Washington, D.C., for gay and lesbian equality. The date was October 11 and the event drew some half a million people. Months after the march, organizers decided to build on its success at promoting GLBT visibility. National Coming Out Day was born.

Chances are that you've observed the event throughout the year, in everyday situations where hiding your sexual orientation or gender identity just didn't seem to make much sense. The YMCA Board of Directors disbanded after a morning meeting where I work, prompting a co-worker to say she didn't know why anyone would volunteer to sit through dull meetings. I offered that the meetings wouldn't be dull if one believed in the organization, a point with which another co-worker agreed. I then remembered seeing the second co-worker's photo in the local paper, in conjunction with an organization for which she is a board member. I mentioned it, and she was pleased to explain the organization to the first woman.

Only then did it occur to me that *I also serve on a board of directors*, and I noted the fact. My co-workers were mildly surprised, like grade-schoolers encountering a teacher in the supermarket and realizing that he also has to shop. I said that the organization is **Positive Voice**, and that it serves gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered people in Northeast Wisconsin. The following silence was a familiar moment of hesitation that occurs in coming out: people are taught that "gay" is controversial, and they fear saying something wrong. I helped out by noting that it isn't easy to find resources and meet people in rural areas, to which the first co-worker replied "Isn't that true."

I didn't say "I'm gay," but I think I suggested it. At the very least, I revealed myself to be more than a desk clerk: I'm someone who supports GLBT people!

## Local Gay TV Commercial

Do you think that you have seen everything? In conservative Northeast WI, there is a local TV commercial that advertises a gay dating service. This may be a first for Green Bay.

This commercial has been airing for weeks on WB14, also known as WIWB, Channel 14, in Green Bay. It is broadcast repeatedly each late night, from about 11pm to 1am.

Known as InteractiveMale, this commercial is for guys who want to meet other men or who are curious. You may tune in late at night or see the commercial on-line at the website: <http://www.interactivemale.com/whatis/index.jsp#>. Click on "watch our commercial." You need to be at least 18 years old to call.

If you visit the website, it states that there is no local Green Bay number to call but the locally aired commercial states the local number is (920) 965-5966.

## HRC Comments on Proposed Anti-Gay Amendment

"Civil marriage is entirely separate from religious marriage. No one is trying to change the beliefs or traditions of churches. Same-sex couples are simply seeking the same rights and protections under the law that most Americans take for granted."

The General Accounting Office found in a 1997 study that there are more than 1,000 federal rights, benefits, protections and responsibilities that same-sex couples are currently denied as they are not permitted civil marriage licenses. Those rights include protections as fundamental as being able to visit a partner in the hospital and make decisions for them should they be unable to, the ability to inherit property without a will or tax penalties, and access to Social Security survivor benefits.

"In our society, government benefits for couples and their children are

available only through a civil, secular 'marriage license.' Until state and federal governments administer benefits on some other basis, tax paying gay couples and their families should have access to such safeguards on an equal basis," said Birch.

In the statement, the USCCB voiced its strong opposition to "any legislative and judicial attempts, both at state and federal levels, to grant same-sex unions the equivalent status and rights of marriage –by naming them marriage, civil unions or by other means."

The Constitution has only been amended 17 times since the Bill of Rights. Passage of the anti-gay Federal Marriage Amendment would mark the first time in U.S. history that the Constitution was amended to specifically deny rights and protections to a single group of Americans.

"Gay Americans are whole and complete human beings, they are parents, children, brothers, sisters, friends, workers, church goers and make important contributions in every community in the country each day," said Birch. "It is difficult to imagine that with all of the problems and challenges facing the country today, the USCCB would spend time and energy trying to deny rights and protections to same-sex couples and their families."

During the four week period between the shows, participating bars will be selling "ribbon cards" for only a dollar, with all proceeds going to local organizations that support persons living with HIV.

### PV September Meeting Report

**POSITIVE VOICE's** Fall kick-off meeting at the Brown County Library featured newly-elected Mayor Jim Schmitt. Close to 30 people were on hand to hear the Mayor discuss his plans for Green Bay and it's future. Prefacing his comments with why he ran for office, Schmitt told the crowd that his emphasis as mayor will be to develop a strong economic base for the city that will include revitalization of the downtown business area (especially the

river-front), and strengthening individual neighborhoods by encouraging their unique characteristic via neighborhood organizations.

Following his remarks, the mayor took questions from the crowd which included specific concerns about budgetary items and GLBT issues. While Schmitt admitted the importance of police bike patrols as a way to bring neighbors closer to their public officials and decrease crime in their areas, the mayor couldn't assure the group that this item wasn't destined for the budgetary ax.

When questioned as to establishing or supporting a "same gender registry" for city dwellers, much-like that in use in Milwaukee and Madison, the mayor seemed surprised at the idea. This allowed the assembled to educate the mayor on our issues of "family" and how important a registry would be to assure basic economic and social rights only currently reserved for married couples.

This writer was startled that this former businessman, and member of many community organizations hadn't heard of or even considered such an idea prior to meeting with PV. One would think he must have met and done business with gays and lesbians prior to this meeting. Regardless, he agreed to hear more about the idea and also welcomed those in attendance to consider serving on one of the many committees or task forces to which he oversees or to which he can appoint members.

By heeding the mayor's call, I think PV and the rest of the GLBT community can strengthen our ties to his office and his influence on the whole Green Bay city council. Perhaps the 90 minutes he shared with us that night will pay dividends in the future when it comes to dealing about diversity issues. He now knows we're his constituents. We've extended our hand to him and his administration. Will he now unashamedly take it to help others in Green Bay build and strengthen a sense of neighborhood and community?
