Gorilla Gay comes to Green Bay!

The Green Bay Action Network (GBAN) is proud to join a movement that is sweeping across the country! Here are the facts: Each month, a traditionally "straight" bar in the Green Bay area is selected by GBAN. From 9:30 p.m. SHARP to 12:00 a.m. the lesbian and gay community and friends pack the bar to capacity. The actual bar location is kept secret until 6:30 p.m. the day of the event. Members and friends of GBAN are informed of that month's bar via email and text message. The bar location is kept secret to prevent the bar from knowing about the rush beforehand and maximizing the "wow" factor when the crowd rushes in. Each month a new bar in a new neighborhood is chosen to increase the amount of unique connections made at each event.

Gorilla Gay picked up steam almost 8 years ago in San Francisco and has spread to cities throughout North America including Los Angeles, Dallas, Edmonton and Milwaukee. The movement began as a way for the gay community to break away from the usual hangouts, if only for a few hours each month. The goal is to help make connections between gays and lesbians and our straight counterparts that may not otherwise happen. It's all about breaking down barriers and fighting against stereotypes.

But Gorilla Gay is much more than reaching out to the straights. It's also a way for sub-groups of our own community to interact and learn more about each other. For at least four hours a month,

twinks can mingle with dykes, bears with lipstick lesbians. Gorilla Gay is not meant to take the place of your local hangout, but help remind us all why we go out in the first place: to meet new people and have fun!

have dealt or are dealing with similar issues, allows me a place to relax and have fun. No fears of being either verbally or physically attacked for being myself. I would recommend to anyone whom refuses to allow gender to restrain them, to join us once a month. Even if you just come once, you will be welcomed like an old friend. I know I was made to feel very welcomed.

The Hate Crime You May Have Missed

Among the numerous school shootings in the past several weeks, one stands out for me: the killing of Lawrence King, 15, allegedly by Brandon McInerney, 14, in Oxnard, California. However, it got the least media coverage.

The other school shootings appeared to be acts of random violence directed at strangers who happened to be in the wrong place at the wrong time. But at Oxnard Junior High School, McInerney walked into the computer lab, went directly to King and shot him in the head before fleeing, according to reports. King died later at the hospital. The memorial service was held at Westminster Presbyterian Church which celebrated Lawrence's short life.

Evidently, McInerney and his friends had been harassing King after King had disclosed that he was gay. Then McInerney took it one step further. King was different, as they say. He was proudly gay and

wore high-heeled boots, make-up and jewelry to school. So he became the target of bullies.

The shooter will be tried as an adult charged with murder as a premeditated hate crime and if convicted, could spend up to 52 years in prison. So where did he learn this kind of hate? My best guess is home, church and peers. Anti-gay sermons, jokes, and language teach people that it is okay to hate lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgendered people, and the action to follow that hate is bullying and violence.

This is not an isolated violent event. In the 2005 National School Climate Survey, nearly a fifth (17.6%) of LGBT students reported being physically assaulted at school in the past school year because of their sexual orientation, and over a tenth (11.8%) because of their gender expression. Nearly two-thirds of LGBT students (64.3%) said they feel unsafe in school because of their sexual orientation, and two-fifths (40.7%) because of their gender expression.

Those of us in the faith communities should be asking ourselves these questions: what are our youth programs and ministries doing to counter the hate and homophobia that is still taught and learned in much of society today? What are we doing to support the Lawrence Kings in our youth groups? What are we doing to challenge the Brandon McInerneys? Two young lives tragically interrupted because it's not okay to be different from the rest.

April 25 will be a national day of silence to remember Lawrence King and all who suffer from hate crimes. Consider organizing an event in your mosque, church or synagogue.

FREEHELD Wins Academy Award!

FREEHELD by Cynthia Wade, produced with assistance from the Women Make Movies Production Assistance program, won this year's **Academy Award® for Best Documentary, Short Subject** at last night's Oscar® ceremonies.

Cynthia Wade's outstanding film is a dramatic chronicle of Lieutenant Laurel Hester's passionate battle during the last three months of her life as she struggles to transfer her pension to her domestic partner, Stacie Andree. Wade, an award-winning documentary director and cinematographer who has made films for HBO, PBS and Cinemax, noted in her acceptance speech, "It was Lieutenant Laurel Hester's dying wish that her fight against discrimination would make a difference for all the same-sex couples across the country that face discrimination every day." Last night's Oscar win, among other numerous awards including the Sundance Special Jury Prize, is helping to make Laurel's wish a reality.

While she was one of the few women filmmakers honored at last night's ceremonies, Cynthia Wade is just one of many women filmmakers who have received support from Women Make Movies. Given the obstacles faced by women in the motion picture industry, WMM is committed to providing critical assistance to the makers of independent media throughout their careers. Countless films from our Production Assistance Program have gone on to achieve great success. Most recently, *THE GREATEST SILENCE: RAPE IN THE CONGO* by Lisa F. Jackson won the Special Jury Prize for Documentary at the 2008 Sundance Film Festival, and was acquired by Women Make Movies for distribution.



FREEHELD is the latest in a string of films associated with WMM to be recognized by the Academy. Films from the Production Assistance program include Kimberly Peirce's *BOYS DON'T CRY*, which garnered the Oscar for **Best Actress in a Leading Role** (Hilary Swank) in 2000 and *MY COUNTRY, MY COUNTRY* by Laura Poitras, nominated for **Best Documentary** in 2007. Oscar nominees from WMM's award-winning collection include *GOD SLEEPS IN RWANDA* by Kimberlee Acquaro and Stacy Sherman and *FERRY TALES* by Katja Esson, both nominated for the **Best Documentary Short Academy Award**.

Eric Breidenbaugh knew something was wrong.

His partner and his partner's parents were all missing – hours overdue from a family flight aboard a small private plane. Eric called his local airport, near Pinellas Park, Florida, to see if they had any information. They did, but they wouldn't give it to him. They said he was "not an actual family member," so they couldn't tell him whether his partner was alive or dead.

He searched the TV news, where he soon saw footage of the plane he himself had ridden in many times. That was how he found out that his life partner of six years, Joseph Bellamy, had been killed with his parents in a plane crash.



HUMAN RIGHTS CAMPAIGN

It's simply wrong that GLBT Americans should be treated like second-class citizens, denied the right to care for their loved ones. Yet even in Eric's own state of Florida, anti-GLBT groups won't rest. They're trying to write a ban on marriage equality into the constitution, and get right-wing voters to the polls while they're at it.

We need to strengthen our field program so we can fight this battle and others, including electing fair-minded candidates and passing key legislation. Your activism and your commitment are critical, as is the financial support so instrumental to our efforts.

The coming weeks are critical. In Florida, the referendum to enshrine discrimination against GLBT couples in the constitution has officially qualified for the November ballot, and opponents are already gearing up and spending cash. A dirty campaign is likely. And in California, right-wing groups are collecting signatures for a similar measure, with a deadline of mid-April.

If either measure passes, our community

could be unable to pass laws preventing heartbreaking stories like Eric Breidenbaugh's. Basic information or access to your partner denied in an emergency. Right-wing extremists that much closer to making inequality permanent nationwide. So HRC is already mobilizing NOW with help from supporters like you, including: Sending in full-time field staff to recruit and train hundreds of volunteers. Donating hundreds of thousands of dollars to state groups in Florida and California.

Helping staff a "Decline to Sign" campaign in California that is already gumming up right-wing signature gathering efforts.

Mobilizing our 700,000 supporters to fight anti-GLBT amendments nationally.

Electing fair-minded candidates who will help oppose initiatives like this.

Think for a moment about the pain and suffering experienced by countless people like Eric Breidenbaugh every single day. Then, resolve to make those injustices a thing of the past by renewing your commitment to this ongoing struggle.

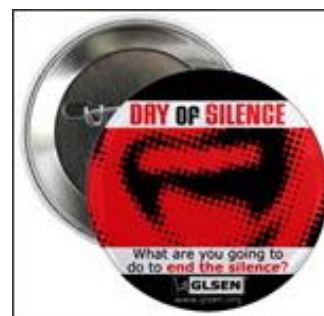
